# FROM THE PRINCIPAL



#### **DEAR PARENTS/ CAREGIVERS**

Once again, we start our newsletter with reference to the pandemic. After a relatively good start to the term all schools were again impacted by the large number of staff

and student absences. SA Health are still saying that we have not reached the peak of the current wave and therefore we have needed to make some adjustments. Our year 12 parent interviews were conducted online and as staff, we continue to meet via teams and small groups in large spaces.

We would like to welcome Mollie Sandercock to our school as the Tigress House Leader winning the position behind **Kirsty Ramsay** who has won a leadership position at Aberfoyle Park High School until the end of the year. We would also like to welcome **Jessica Kuss** teaching Visuals Arts, **Zoe Muller** teaching English and Humanities and **Gen Skehan** as part of the Student Services team.

#### **TERM 2 ACADEMIC ACHIEVERS**

PRINCIPAL'S MORNING TEA AND GROWTH AWARDS

On Monday 1 August, 85 of our high achieving students (10% of our mainstream students)

attended the week 2 celebration in our Performing Arts Centre theatre. We had 20 more students receiving predominantly A's in term 2, compared with term 1. In addition, this term we recognised and acknowledge the academic growth our students have demonstrated from term 1 to term 2.

The growing number of students receiving these awards is reassuring and recognises the hard work of all staff in continuously developing and reflecting on curriculum to ensure that it extends all learning, including our high achievers. This growth has been reflected in both our 2021 NAPLAN and SACE results, which have been the highest to date. Details of our school performance is outlined in our "2021 Annual Report" available on our school website.

Congratulations to all term 2 award recipients.

#### SCHOOL UNIFORM

We would like to thank parents and caregivers for your ongoing support of students wearing our school uniform. School uniform is important for safety and a sense of belonging.

Listening to feedback from parents, students and staff, our Governing Council has approved the review of school pants. The Student Representative Council (SRC) will be leading the process for us to select a new school pant that meets the following criteria set by our Governing Council. The new

pants need to be affordable, warm, unisex, classic style (not date), comfortable, available, charcoal colour and durable.

Students, parents and staff will be consulted with a final vote on selecting one bottom from 3-4 options that meet the criteria. The selected uniform will replace the current Dickies style pant, with all current pant options remaining. We hope to have the new bottom in place for winter 2023.

# In the interim, can we please remind parents and caregivers that:

- Students wearing plain black leggings without a school skirt will be asked to wear a skirt or pants and will be provided with a clean loan uniform
- Hoodies are not to be worn under or over school uniform and that tucking in a hoody is not an option. Students will be asked to remove the hoody
- Tracksuit pants of any colour or kind are not part of our school uniform.

We recognise that it has been a cold and wet winter and we completely understand that student's layer under the school jumpers and that we do ask that students remove layering as the day heats up. As of 1 September, students will be required to be in correct school uniform. Students not wearing the appropriate school uniform will be provided with a clean loan uniform for the day.

Please refer to our school uniform policy published on our website for further clarification or contact your student's house or year level leader with any further question regarding our school uniform requirements.

Once again, we appreciate your ongoing support of our school uniform policy.

#### **STUDENT SERVICES**

#### STUDENT ABSENCE

Do you know you can text or phone straight through to Student Services for your child's absence, lateness or when they need to leave early? **Student Services has a direct phone line 8327 5241** that can be called to report absences. If the line is busy, the message will go to message bank, which is checked regularly and the absence recorded.

Alternatively, you can text absences on **0418 155 901**. Please note that these numbers are for **absences only**; for all other enquiries, please call the front office on **8327 5200**.

#### **FEELING UNWELL**

Our school has a policy regarding students leaving for illness. In the first instance, students should let their teacher know, have a note written in their diary and then come to Student Services. If the student needs to

go home because of their illness, you will receive a call from the school to confirm that your student needs to be picked up or allowed to go home (dependent on the illness / injury).

Please discourage your child from phoning you directly before coming into Student Services as we will not be aware that they are ill. This will avoid delays in providing first aid / medical assistance / you picking up your child and it ensures our Duty of Care to all students.

#### **SIGNING OUT EARLY**

If your child has a note to leave school early for an appointment / family reasons etc., it is their responsibility to show the note to staff at Student Services BEFORE signing out. Home Study students are also expected to show their timetable to staff at Student Services before they sign out.

# **HEALTH PROMOTION**

The Stage 1 Health and Wellbeing class has recently been learning about the concept of health promotion, its history, and strategies for improving the health and wellbeing of groups within society. On Wednesday 24 August, students experienced a presentation from Joanna Overall and Katie Trinh from Wellbeing SA, who spoke about health promotion, current initiatives, and pathways in this industry. The tower building competition involved a limited supply of newspaper and tape that needed to be able to support a whole kilogram! Many of our students succeeded in building these towers. Another competition required a series of pipes and joins to transport a tennis ball, unassisted, from the table to over the line in only 5 minutes. One group of boys managed to be the first group of the day to successfully put together these pipes and it only took them just over 2 minutes!

There were plenty of exhibits to keep the students entertained, from bugs and spiders to patting animals, electric cars and defence vehicles, to robots and virtual reality, creative new innovations and even a human size soap bubble. All the students had exceptional behaviour and put all their energy into the day – they were clearly exhausted on the train ride back to school!

#### **SILC SOLITAIRE WOODWORK PROJECT**

Over recent weeks several of our young people have been engaged in making a SILC version of the board game of strategy known as "Solitaire".


Staff introduced a home-made version of the game a little while back and some young people play regularly. We approached our woodwork facilitator with the idea of making one for SILC and he sourced the amazing piece of red gum.

Students measured out the positions for the 33 holes, mapped out a template for the holes on paper, drilled the carefully measured holes and routed the channels for the pieces removed during the game. There were hours of sanding and the final touch was a few coats of orange oil to bring out the grains in the wood and to assist in preserving the timber.

The game will now sit in the SILC classroom, A leader board has been created for young people to see how their scores improve over time.

Thanks to our woodwork guru Sam along with SILC students Aydan, Kayne, Tyler and Elliot for their contribution to this incredible piece of art.

# AUSTRALIAN DEFENCE FORCE ACADEMY OPEN DAY

I was lucky enough to be selected to attend the Australian Defence Force Academy (ADFA) open day in Canberra. Schools from around Australia came together for this 3 day opportunity, which also included a tour of the Royal Military College (RMC).

ADFA is the defence forces own university, where students can study a range of degrees with a guaranteed career with the defence force upon graduation. The degree is paid for in full by the ADF, and students actually get paid to attend including subsidised housing. They offer grants, schemes and pre-recruitment programs for high school students at risk of engagement, who have a learning difficulty, are remote, indigenous, or have not completed school. At the open day, I was able to attend workshops and lectures about the recruitment process, the degrees they have on offer, and campus life.

The RMC is where the military training is held. We were able to see and experience what it is like to train in the military. We didn't have to do any pushups, but we had the chance to learn about all aspects of training including the importance of sleep and food, warfare tactics and leadership skills. We were also shown their accommodation, physical training program and their mess hall where we had a lovely little lunch with the lads & ladies in camouflage.

It was fantastic chatting to the many people there, from all walks of life, and hearing all their different stories that lead them to the ADF and their experiences within their time there. Any students interested in the ADF, please don't hesitate to contact me for further information.

#### **PERIOD POVERTY**

"The existence of period poverty is a fundamental human rights issue which reveals much about the health of a society. And when it comes to young people, the problem is far from addressed here in South Australia." #endperiodpoverty

#### **SO, WHAT IS PERIOD POVERTY?**

Period poverty is defined as the lack of access to sanitary products, menstrual hygiene education, toilets, hand washing facilities, and / or waste management. Period poverty disproportionately affects marginalised groups including those who are unemployed, homeless or displaced due to domestic violence. Access to menstrual products is a fundamental human rights and dignity issue.

Over the coming months there will be a digital campaign (funded by the Commissioner for Children and Young People SA) to raise awareness of 'period poverty'. Alongside the digital campaign we will be making available free pads and tampons to students of the school through dispensers installed in the Library (school) toilets.
